Broadway comes to Cincinnati via "The Great Light Way" 40th anniversary gala for Lighthouse Youth Services.

Tony Award-winning star Brian Stokes Mitchell is

the guest artist at the gala. It will be Saturday, April 25, at the Hyatt Regency Cincinnati.

The black-tie event, Lighthouse's major annual fundraiser, starts at 6:30 p.m. with a reception. Dinner is at 7:30 p.m., followed by the performance by Mitchell. The evening also includes a raffle and live auction.
